The Canadian Domestic Homicide Prevention Initiative with Vulnerable Populations (CDHPVP) has now published the fourth domestic homicide brief titled "Domestic Violence in Immigrant and Refugee Populations: Culturally-Informed Risk and Safety Strategies". The Brief provides definitions, describes the context and unique risk factors for domestic homicide within immigrant and refugee populations, and highlights culturally-informed and culturally-specific domestic violence risk assessment, risk management, and safety planning strategies to respond to, and prevent, potentially lethal domestic violence.
