6) CANADIAN DOMESTIC HOMICIDE PREVENTION CONFERENCE, London Ontario, October 18-19, Early Bird Registration Now Open through May 31

A conference for policy makers, mental health, justice and social service professionals involved in the prevention, assessment, management and safety planning for domestic violence and domestic homicide, particularly those working with Indigenous, rural, remote, northern, immigrant and refugee populations, and children exposed to domestic violence. The conference will be held at the London Convention Centre, 300 York St, London ON N6B 1P8.

Conference Themes:

- Working with Indigenous, rural, remote & northern; immigrant & refugee populations; and children exposed to domestic violence

This is a powerful interview by the Current’s Anna Maria Tremonti on a ground-breaking film, *A Better Man*, involving a retrospective discussion between Attiya Khan, a victim (who is the co-producer of the film), and her abusive former partner, Steve, regarding their violent teen relationship twenty years ago <http://www.cbc.ca/radio/thecurrent/the-current-for-april-25-2017-1.4083138/has-it-affected-him-woman-confronts-her-abuser-in-documentary-a-better-man-1.4083139>. While the content is disturbing, it describes the long term impact of this violence on the victim as well as resilience for recovery. Another important aspect of the film is the message "that people who use violence do need help and that help does exist." The documentary *A Better Man* will premiere during the Hot Docs festival on April 30 in Toronto and Ms. Khan will be travelling across the country with her film to raise awareness and promote prevention of intimate partner violence.

The Knowledge Hub, Faculty of Education, Western University, facilitated a Knowledge Exchange for the Trauma- and Violence-Informed Community of Practice on March 20-21, 2017. Discussions focused on highlighting investment objectives, reviewing proposed common outcome indicators among projects, issues related to trauma- and violence-informed research and practice, and lessons learned from project challenges and solutions.

2) PAC Member Judy Clark to Receive UPEI Honourary Degree, May 13

UPEI announced that PAC Member Judy Clark is one of four people recognized as leaders in their respective fields who will be awarded an honorary Doctor of Laws degree at Convocation ceremonies on May 13, 2017.

Elder Judith Clark (excerpt from UPEI announcement – see link to full announcement, below)

Judy Clark is a Mi'kmaq woman from Epekwitk and a member of Abegweit First Nation. She has served as the president for the Aboriginal Women's Association of PEI for five terms since 2008, and prior to that as vice-president. In this volunteer position, Ms. Clark has raised the profile of the organization and proven to be a strong advocate for the interests of Aboriginal families, particularly in reducing violence against Aboriginal women and girls. She has been involved in honouring the missing and murdered Indigenous women through the Sisters in Spirit national campaign since its inception. This past summer, Ms. Clark facilitated eight study sessions at the Confederation Centre Library for the public to read and understand the summary of the final report of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada. As a respected Mi'kmaq Elder, Ms. Clark is often called upon for her spiritual support and to share her teachings with her community members. She holds a Certificate in Conflict Resolution Studies from UPEI and serves as a Circle Keeper with the Mi'kmaq Confederacy of PEI Justice Program, on the RCMP Commissioner's National Aboriginal Advisory Committee, and on the RCMP-PEI Commanding Officer's Aboriginal Advisory Committee. She is a long-time supporter of UPEI and, since 2001, has served as Knowledge Keeper for the Faculty of Education, guest lecturing many classes to provide insights and context on a range of Indigenous issues. She has also made herself available to UPEI in an advisory role to both senior administration and the Mawi'omi Aboriginal Student Centre.

3) New Handbook Helps Provincial Government Support Employees Affected by Family Violence

A new handbook will help the provincial government recognize and respond to employees affected by family violence.

The handbook, Guidelines for Addressing Family Violence and the Workplace will help managers and supervisors recognize the signs of family violence and provide guidance to support employees affected by family violence, along with contact information for community resources and trained professionals. It does not replace the services of trained professionals.

The handbook was developed through the collaborative efforts of the Interministerial Women’s Secretariat, the Public Service Commission and the departments of Justice and Family and Human Services.
