2) Audition Call for Family Violence Prevention Videos, September 17 and 18

An audition call is now available, inviting actors to be part of an exciting, unique in Canada video series aimed to help recognize signs of family violence in everyday settings -- and to take action to safely intervene.

There will be approximately twenty on-screen speaking roles for male, female, and non-binary actors of a variety of ages, abilities, and backgrounds. For those successfully cast, payment will be by honorarium.

Filmed in Charlottetown businesses, with the City of Charlottetown as the lead project sponsor, The "Make It Your Business" video series will be designed for use in workplace training and also be promoted to the general public. It will emphasize small, straightforward actions people can take in everyday life to notice and to help when they see signs of possible family violence. The project plan and scripts have been developed by the City of Charlottetown's Mayor's Purple Ribbon Task Force on Family Violence Prevention. Videos will be produced by Mugisha Enterprises.

In-person auditions, to be recorded on video, will take place in September for filming in October.

Her research areas include restorative justice, rape culture, violence against women, criminal harassment and use of law to address social problems, particularly those that disproportionately affect women. REMINDER DETAILS

1) Violence Against Women Prevention Grant, Application Deadline September 29

The Interministerial Women's Secretariat provides assistance to the provincial government to promote the legal, health, social and economic equality of women. In addition, the Secretariat works in partnership with community organizations to develop projects, programs and services that benefit women in Prince Edward Island.

The impacts of sexual violence, family violence and other forms of violence against women are both immediate and long-term. As a result, they affect many sectors of society. Violence against women comes at a high social cost and the outcomes are apparent in our social, health and justice systems. Violence against women impacts Prince Edward Island’s economic development and workforce. It impacts education, whether a student is personally experiencing peer-to-peer violence during the school day or violence in their home.

Victims and survivors of violence against women include women-identifying people across all economic circumstances, geographic locations, ages, abilities and racial and cultural backgrounds. Violence against women impacts our communities, both rural and urban. Whether directly or indirectly, violence against women affects all members of our society. And each community experiences violence against women in unique, specific ways.

As such, it is vital to focus on prevention measures. The Violence Against Women Prevention Grant will be administered through the Interministerial Women's Secretariat to fund projects whose focus is the prevention of violence against women in PEI.

FUNDING PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

The objective of the Violence Against Women Prevention Grant is to provide project funding to community organizations for innovative projects that will enhance awareness, education and action towards preventing violence against women in Prince Edward Island.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

Incorporated non-profit organizations from Prince Edward Island will be eligible for funding. Projects from individuals (that is, projects that are submitted by individuals and not on behalf of a non-profit organization) will not be eligible. As these are one-time only grants, projects that require multi-year funding will not be considered. All groups must commit to signing a contract and adhering to the requirements of the contract (including stipulations regarding insurance, reporting, or other).

All budgets need to clearly demonstrate how proposed expenditures are related to the project. Eligible expenditures include:

- Salaries and benefits;
- Honoraria;
- Professional fees related to the project;
- Facility rental and utilities;
- Office equipment;
- Materials and supplies;
- Publicity and promotion;
- Provincial travel;
- Evaluation.

ASSESSMENT CRITERIA

The Interministerial Women's Secretariat grant applications will be assessed and graded on a point system based on the applicant's ability to communicate how it meets the objectives of the funding program as expressed by the following criteria:

- Does the proposal clearly articulate how the project will enhance the prevention of violence against women in and/or girls in PEI through community awareness, public education activities and/or action?
- Does the proposal clearly describe the project activities to prevent violence against women in PEI?
- Is the project likely to succeed (for example, does it propose realistic timelines and achievable goals)?
- Does the proposal show a strong focus on prevention measures that are likely to be effective?
- Does the proposal provide examples of community support for the project (for example, letters of support that clearly identify the benefits of funding this project)?
- Is the project budget clear, and is it an appropriate financial request for the proposed activities?
- Does the proposal show evidence-based ways to respond to preventing violence against women?

- Does the proposal clearly identify anticipated project outcomes and describe how the project will be evaluated?

Please note that for each project you must submit a minimum of one letter of support from stakeholders and/or project partners in order to be considered for funding

APPLICATION PROCESS

Proposals must be received by September 29, 2017, and must meet the eligibility requirements (see **ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS** above). Any proposals that do not meet the eligibility requirements will be immediately disqualified. Proposals will be assessed and graded on a point system based on the applicant's ability to communicate how their project meets the objectives of the funding program as expressed by the assessment criteria. A review committee will assess all eligible proposals. All final funding decisions will be made by the Minister Responsible for the Status of Women. Successful applicants will be notified by the International Day of the Elimination of Violence Against Women (November 25, 2017).

5) Canadian Domestic Violence Conference 5: Networking the grassroots domestic violence movement from across Canada, March 20-23, 2018

The Canadian Domestic Violence Conference 5 is a national showcase of ground-breaking grassroots initiatives that address intimate partner violence. This vital annual

conference will feature influential presenters who are bringing about change in community-based groups, academics and government agencies. An extensive array of participating organizations include women's shelters, women's centres, Partner Assault Response (PAR) programs, men's treatment programs, family therapists, restorative justice facilitators, probation offices, police, crown prosecutors, judges, victim services officers, children mental health workers, child protection workers, addiction counselors, health care workers, clergy, educators and others engaged in direct service.

While primarily emphasizing men's violence against women, this Conference will also focus conversations on the margins of the field, such as violence in same-sex relationships; violence with people with disabilities; in aboriginal relationships; first generation immigrant relationships; and straight women's perpetration of abuse.

To address the diversity among women, the conference will explore conversations with women who want to leave, women who are ambivalent about their relationships and women who know they want to stay. This broad range of discussions will include individual, couple, family and group conversations.

This year, the CDVC5 will highlight trailblazing community initiatives designed to challenge social determinants of domestic violence. While primarily challenging sexism, the Conference will also focus on how the field is challenging key issues such as racism, poverty, homophobia, and ableism.

The mandate of the Conference is to move the field forward, and therefore encourages participants and presenters to highlight and share innovative approaches that are developing in the various communities across Canada.
