

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Background

In the Spring of 2005, 1,241 grade 12 students across Prince Edward Island were surveyed regarding their expectations following high school. This marked the seventh year that the survey was conducted by the Department of Education. The objectives of the survey were to:

- continue the tracking of PEI high school graduates and
- help decision makers be more responsive to the needs of high school students in preparation for the transition from secondary schools to either post-secondary institutions or immediately to the labour force.

The 2005 survey instrument was revised and was comprised of four sections which included:

- Personal Information
- Background Information
- Future Plans After High School
- Opinions

The questionnaire was administered in both official languages.

The main purpose of this survey was to allow the Department of Education to make informed recommendations both within the department and to educational partners.

Family Composition and Residence

Of the students surveyed in 2005, 73% lived with both parents and 18% lived with their mother/female guardian. The majority of students surveyed (90%) have lived in Prince Edward Island for more than 11 years.

Preparation for After Graduation

Academic language programs were selected more often than Advanced, General or Practical language programs. Overall, 84% of anglophone students took Academic English in grade 12, while 97% of francophone students enrolled in Academic French.

The factors which students indicated had the most influence on high school course selection were personal interest (54%) and ability (13%). The factors with the lowest influence on course selection were parents (5%), friends (4%) and teachers (3%).

Future Plans and Expectations

After high school approximately 72% (888) of graduates plan to continue their education, either through university, college, trade school or upgrading. Of the remaining respondents, 15% of graduates plan to enter the workforce immediately after high school, 5% specified that they have other plans, and the remaining 8% of respondents are unsure of their plans.

Over 50% (622) of survey respondents plan to attend university. Of these students, 62% plan on attending the University of PEI, and 31% of students plan on attending a university off-Island. Students chose the university they plan to attend for various reasons, the most common being that it offers the program they want to take (28%) or that they will be able to live at home (27%). Nearly half (44%) of university-bound students indicated that they will obtain a student loan in order to pay for the majority of their education. The most popular choices of university program fields are Sciences (43%) and Arts (34%).

Over 17% (212) of survey respondents plan to attend college. Of these students 72% plan on attending Holland College, while 21% plan on attending a college/technical school off-Island.

Students chose the college they plan to attend for various reasons, however the most common reason given for their choice of college was that it offers the program they want to take (79%). Nearly half (49%) of college-bound students indicated that they will obtain a student loan in order to pay for the majority of their education. The most popular choices of college programs are Computer Technology, Tourism & Travel Management, Business Administration and Carpentry with 6% of students selecting each program.

Approximately 15% (189) of survey respondents plan to enter the workforce or be registered for a trade apprenticeship. The most popular choices for apprenticeships are Carpentry and Automotive Service Technician.

Opinions

Students were asked their opinions on several statements regarding career plans and life long learning.

- 83% of students thought about going to university, 67% of students thought a university degree would allow them to fulfill their career goals.
- 61% of students thought about going to college, 47% of students thought a college diploma would fulfill their career goals.
- 80% of students thought they needed to have a career goal now, 19% thought planning for their career could wait.
- 96% of students agreed that making a good living was important to them, 81% thought that enjoying their job was more important than the amount of money they made.
- 49% of students did not believe they had enough money to go to university or college, 28% thought that everyone who needed a student loan could get one.
- 43% of students expected to be able to find work in their chosen occupation in PEI, 42% thought they would be able to achieve their job or career goals in PEI, and 30% of students indicated that they planned to live in PEI permanently.

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BACKGROUND AND METHODOLOGY

This report is a continuation of the tracking of Island grade 12 graduates which was initiated in the spring of 1998 in a report called *Encouraging Island Graduates to Return/Remain Home 1998*. Since that time the survey has been modified and implemented each year (except for 2004). This 2005 report is the seventh in the series and contains survey results which will be used to help determine the future plans of these graduates.

In the Spring of 2005, the *Expectations of Island Students 2005: Questions for Grade 12 Senior High Students* survey (referred to hereafter as the survey) was distributed to all Island high schools for completion by their grade 12 students.

Administration of the survey in each school was determined by the principal and teachers. Once completed, surveys were collected and sent to the PEI Department of Education for data entry and analysis.

The survey asked students to supply the following information: name, address, postal code, home phone number and other contact number. This information was entered in a database and will enable researchers to track these students in the future.

The following section of the report provides an analysis of the survey results. Appendix A contains the tabular presentation of responses for each question in the survey. Appendix B contains a copy of the survey in both official languages.

SURVEY RESPONDENTS

Response Rate

The survey was completed by 1,241 grade 12 students out of a possible 1,695¹. This marked a participation rate of 73%.

Figure 1 presents the distribution of students by high school. Of the students who responded to the survey, 52% were female and 48% were male.



Personal and Background Information

The survey asked students to indicate who they lived with (most of the time). Close to three-quarters (73%) of students indicated that they resided with both parents or guardians, 19% lived with their mother or female guardian and 5% lived with their father or male guardian.

Of the 295 students who responded that they lived with a single parent or guardian, 78% lived with their mother or female guardian, while only 22% lived with their father or male guardian.



The survey asked students to indicate how long they had lived in PEI. Close to 90% indicated that they had lived in PEI for more than eleven years.



PREPARATION FOR AFTER GRADUATION

High School Course Selections

Of the 1,241 students who responded to the survey, 97% (1207 students) attended Anglophone schools. The other 3% (34 students) of students attended Francophone schools. Students were asked to identify which language course(s) they took during grade 12.

Anglophone Language Course Selection

Table 1 presents the rates of English courses taken by those students attending Anglophone schools. The majority (84%) of these students enrolled in Academic English.

Francophone Language Course Selection

Table 2 presents the rates of language courses taken by those students attending Francophone schools. Over half of respondents (65%) indicated that they had enrolled in both Français 621 and Anglais 621.

Factors Influencing Course Selection

Students were asked to indicate which factor had the most influence on their grade 12 course selection. Over half (54%) of students indicated that personal interest had the most influence.



Course Selection and Future Planning

Students were asked a series of questions to determine if they had started making plans for their futures since beginning high school. They were asked if they had taken French immersion, and if they had assistance with selecting their courses, planning for post-secondary education and career planning.

French Immersion

Students were asked if they took French immersion while in high school. Close to one-quarter (22%) of survey respondents indicated yes, they had taken French immersion.

Course Selection and Information to Support Post-Secondary Education

Figure 5 presents the rates of respondents who indicated yes, they had taken courses or had received information that supported their planning for post-secondary education. In all cases, except for receiving information on trade apprenticeships, the results showed that over 70% of students made plans and choices that supported plans for post-secondary education. In particular, 88% of respondents had taken courses that would prepare them for a post-secondary education.



Assistance with Career Planning

In the survey, most students indicated they had not used career planning resources. Of the resources available, the Choices Career Planning program was selected most often by survey respondents (30%).



FUTURE PLANS AND EXPECTATIONS

Immediate Plans after High School

The survey asked students to indicate their plans for the fall and whether they planned to continue their education or work. The results are presented in Figure 7 by gender. Results show that more females planned to attend university, while more males planned to attend college or enter the workforce.



Plans to Attend University

Of the students who planned to go on to university, the majority (63%) indicated that they planned to attend the University of Prince Edward Island. About one third (31%) planned to attend a university off-Island.

Of the 31% of students who indicated plans to attend a university off-Island, 76% chose an institution within Atlantic Canada. The top three choices were: University of New Brunswick, St. Francis-Xavier and Dalhousie University. (For a breakdown of off-Island institutions, please see Appendix A.)



Reasons for Choosing a University

Students who planned to go to university were asked to indicate the top reason for deciding to go to their university of choice. More than a quarter (28%) of respondents indicated that the university had the program they wanted to take, while another quarter (27%) indicated that they could live at home while attending university. Of those who responded, 15% chose other reasons which included: the university is close to home, received a scholarship/bursary, sports, do not want to leave the Island, and it was the only university they were accepted to.

Paying for University Education

Students who planned to go to university were asked to indicate how they would pay for the majority of their education. Most respondents indicated either a student loan (44%) or parent(s)/guardian(s) (21%).



Status of University Acceptance

Students who planned to go to university were asked to indicate whether or not (at the time of the survey) they had been accepted for the fall. The majority of respondents (79%) indicated yes, they had been accepted; less than 1% indicated no, they did not get accepted (Table 4).

Choice of University Program

Students who planned to attend university were asked which program they planned to take. The top responses were the sciences (43%) and arts (34%). These were followed by business administration/commerce (14%) and education (6%) at lower rates.

The rates of male and female students entering the business administration/commerce field were the same. A greater number of females were planning to enter health sciences, while more males than females planned on entering applied sciences. (Please see Appendix A for breakdown by gender.)



Plans to Attend College

Of the students who planned to go on to college, close to three quarters (72%) indicated that they planned to attend Holland College. One in five (21%) students planned to attend a technical school or community college off-Island. (For a breakdown of off-Island institutions, please see Appendix A.)



Reasons for Choosing a College

Students who planned to go to college were asked to indicate the top reason for deciding to go to their college of choice. The majority (78%) of respondents indicated that the college had the program they wanted to take (Table 5).

Paying for College Training and Education

Students who planned to go to college were asked to indicate how they would pay for the majority of their training and education. Half (50%) of respondents indicated that they would obtain a student loan. Another third of the respondents indicated that they would work while studying (16%) or rely on their parent(s)/guardian(s) (16%).



Status of College Acceptance

Students who planned to attend college were asked to indicate whether or not (at the time of the survey) they had been accepted for the fall. The majority of respondents (62%) indicated yes, that they had been accepted, and less than 1% indicated no, they had not been accepted (Table 6).



Over half of these respondents (58%) indicated yes, that they had a job upon completion of high school.





Do you plan to live in Prince Edward Island on a permanent basis?



If you had to leave for work or university/college, would you return to work in PEI?



Do you expect to find work in your chosen occupation in PEI?



Have you considered establishing your own business in PEI?



Do you think that you will be able to achieve your job or career goals in PEI?



CONCLUSION


Between 1998 and 2005 this survey has been conducted 7 times. The results have been used to assist the Department of Education in making informed recommendations within the department and to educational partners.

The information collected through the survey has remained consistent in a couple of key areas. This has allowed for reporting on trends related to students' plans after high school and their post-secondary programs of interest.

The Grade 12 Survey was a self-report survey and students were asked about their "plans". What we do not know is whether these students followed through on what they indicated they were going to do, and what their experience has been since leaving high school. For this reason, the Department of Education will implement a longitudinal survey process. A follow-up survey of these same students will be carried out in the spring/summer of 2007. The target population will be the 2005 Grade 12 Survey respondents. This group will have been out of high school for two years. The survey will focus on three key themes of their experience:

- 1. WHAT have been their primary activities since leaving high school.
- 2. WHERE have they chosen to undertake their primary activities and to live.
- 3. WHY have they made the choices regarding their primary activity and the location of their activity and residence (i.e. preparedness, influences and barriers).

The survey will be designed to examine these three key themes in the context of past, present and future.
